Dear President Obama:

You are the first President to whom I have written during my 76 years as an American. I don't take this first one lightly and I hope you don't either. I was born during FDR's first term. The intervening years provided enough drama to fill a set of encyclopedias.

You are a remarkable entry in this panorama for many reasons. I'll mention only two. The first is that you occupy center stage while our national divisions are immense. The second is that you have what it takes to do something about it. This letter suggests how.

Please give credence and attention to an emerging force that can help you do the job you want to do. It helped you get elected. I believe it can help our Nation return to a more balanced approach to our serious challenges—a theme I often hear from you.

This is not a new request. Jacqueline Salit and Harry Kresky, of IndependentVoting.org urged it over a year ago. "It" was to appoint at least one member of the Federal Election Commission from the ranks of independent voters. Please consider it now.

Independent voters may soon be half of the voting public (now over a third), yet we continue to fight for our voting rights. This is because the democratic and republican parties fear losing power. They have already lost it by demonstrating repeatedly that they care most about their own agendas rather than America. How terribly disappointing.

This is why caring citizens are leaving the parties in droves. I urge you to respond to this growing phenomenon by appointing two independent voters to the Federal Elections Commission. I believe it would mark a huge gain in legitimacy of our political process.

The main thing that counts for the major parties is votes—and the money to get them. An analogy helps to see the result. We are a nation going down the road with one foot on the gas and the other on the brake pedal. That is a prescription for disaster and we are already seeing many of its dimensions. We can surely do better and I know you agree.

The analogy continues. It is impossible to reach any destination by driving part way at full speed and then reversing course to speed in the opposite direction. That's how the democratic and republican parties now behave. The functional and dollar cost of this pattern is astronomical. We simply can't afford it. Our deficit is measured not only in dollars, horrific as that is, but in paucity of sustainable accomplishment.

The tragedy is that each party actually offers real substance that merits consideration. But statesmanship has been abandoned and that substance is lost in the noise.

Yes, I know. You are a member of the democratic party. You cannot lose their total support. And you also need significant support from independents. I believe you can help to legitimize the political process in a way that appeals to thoughtful citizens over a wide political spectrum by broadening true representation on the Commission—including currently disenfranchised independents. It would allow the original intent for this body to be performed with much greater fealty than has been the case, especially recently.

Combined with a growing pattern of open elections among the states, I believe there is a good chance that it will force the two parties to operate in a more productive way, one that curtails the currently prevailing motivation to demonize and destroy each other.

Of course, this is risky. Risk is not unknown to you, before or since your election. What is at stake is restoring congressional ability to solve real problems. You need—and deserve—a congress that is capable of governing. Current party dogma is a poor substitute for thinking. I believe your thoughtful approach to problem solving can be significantly reinforced by the influence independent voters can exert on the process. In any case, isn't a continuation of the current mode of operation an even greater risk?

Mine is only one voice. But there are millions who would sign this letter.

Thank you for stepping forward to lead us. I am grateful for your commitment and admire what you stand for. I only ask now that you take this step toward recognizing this reality: our nation can no longer afford a political process that treats over a third of the voters as if they didn't exist—or matter. That must be changed if the political parties are ever to manifest the best instead of the worst of what they have to offer. For that matter, independent thinkers may have a few ideas of merit as well. Let's find out.

I hope you find this helpful, Mr. President. That is my intent and desire.

If we don't do this, the future looks very dim for my children and my grandchildren. You are the biggest HOPE we've had in years. I am writing to you to urge you to change the course of your administration - not in the way Republicans want, but in response to the independent movement in this country.

40% of Americans identify themselves as "independent" voters. They feel that government is run for the parties and special interests, not what's best for the American people.

During your campaign, you promised to "Change" politics in our country. To your credit, you tried to reach out to Republicans on several occasions. But bipartisan is not the same as nonpartisan. And while you need to reach across the aisle in Congress to "get something done", you also have to open up the process and expand the partisan boundaries. You have let new political forces -- like independents and young people -- in.

So what new direction should you take?

First off, stop handing over your policy initiatives to the Nancy Pelosis, Harry Reids, and Rahm Emmanuels. These Democratic Party partisans think about party first, and despite them having the same party ID as you, they are not allies in changing politics.



I am a county commissioner who writes to you as an independent leader in my community. I, like you, ran as a Democratic candidate for office and it wasn't long after taking my seat in our small county in Southwest Colorado that I started noticing something rather disturbing. I began taking note that my constituents and the issues of greatest concern to them were being pulled back and forth in a no win tug of war. This power struggle between two teams was being fueled by many things, but the most powerful was and is the two-party political system that governs, or perhaps a more appropriate statement would be to say "dictates" our country. Call for open primaries for federal, state and local elections; independent voters must be allowed to play on a level playing field. Support efforts to create nonpartisan redistricting commissions; gerrymandering state legislators should no longer be able to call elections even before they're held.

Of course I understand that you have the economy to fix. There's terrorism. There's climate change, and the deficit, and a host of other issues that demand your attention. But surely the overriding issue is the quality of our democracy, which the "spirit of party" has systematically despoiled. It's the reform of American democracy, after all, that makes everything else possible.

I went to Harlem recently to hear Dr. Lenora Fulani interview the director and all black cast of an avant garde play^{1[1]} based on the writings of Heiner Müller—the famous German dramatist.

The four cast members who were interviewed spoke about how important it was for them to be able to perform outside the roles typically available to them as black actors. Watching them on stage, the joy and power they express as they “go new places” is deeply impacting—liberating not only to themselves but to audiences, the playwright Müller, and the whole of European and American theater traditions.

During the election, and as a candidate, you blew past so many prescribed roles, and the American people did too. It was a *great performance* and the world applauded. As an independent, a progressive, and a political organizer for over 20 years, it was especially gratifying to me to mobilize independents across a national network built over two decades time, to back you in the Democratic Party primary (in open primary states) and be a vital part of the coalition that propelled you to victory.

To say the “show” in Washington is somewhat of a comedown by comparison is an understatement. Partisanship, with its predictable drawing of battle lines, prevails. Of course, I appreciate governing in that environment is not the same as being a candidate. Thankfully, the independent movement is not hindered by such constraints and our efforts to move our country beyond partisanship have expanded since 2008. My name is JB Opdycke and I am an independent voter from New York City. I voted for Mike Dukakis, Lenora Fulani, Ross Perot, John Hagelin, Ralph Nader and...you, and I am proud to say that voting for you in 2008 was one of the first times I've had a smile on my face when I entered the voting booth, both because I was enthusiastic about supporting you, but also because when I voted at 6:05 AM there was already 100 people lined up at my poll to vote.

Our very system of elections is broken! Gerrymandered, uncompetitive, districts are the norm in every state. Primary elections are off limits to non-party voters in 25 states. The political parties have been given a free reign for 50 years to re-write election laws so that their needs are met while the voters needs are ignored. How can it be that while the fastest group of voters in New York is independent, "no-party" voters, we are barred from voting in primaries, have no representation at the Board of Elections, and cannot even, by law, work the polls on Election Day!

Partisanship is a national scourge. It corrodes our ability to move forward as a country. I don't need to tell you that – you face it every day of the week. And I understand you need the support of the Democratic Party to get your legislation passed. You cannot act "above the law" of Washington (where the law is "obey the party.") But you must find creative ways to take on partisanship. You could verse yourself on the growing movement to abolish closed party primaries and insert yourself into the conversation in appropriate ways. You could support efforts to end Gerrymandering—even in situations where the Democratic Party is most opposed to it. You could appoint an independent to the Federal Election Commission – you have the power to do so under the current statute.

There are dozens of efforts taking place across the country to reign in the partisan control of the election process, and your involvement, even from afar, could and would be of enormous benefit for the country.

Many of us are now disappointed that you have made little effort to reach out to independents and the growing, grassroots independent movement. We need you to make it clear that you want us independents in the political process. If you do that, you will be making a statement about the kind of America you are fighting for - one that is inclusive of all people.

Americans want real change, and we independents are angered by what the insiders - the parties and special interests -- are doing to our country. Change only comes from the outside in. That's why we are going to continue to push for political reforms that can shake up party domination. Independents want open primaries like we have with the "Top Two " process in Washington. Independents want to be able to vote for the candidate and not the party. We want nonpartisan redistricting reform, nonpartisan elections, and nonpartisan election administrations including appointing an independent to the Federal Elections Commission.

In other words, we want policies that bring real change, not partisan posturing. Thank you,
